



The Situations deal with violations of the Bill of Rights. For each situation, tell what violation is being committed and which amendment provides protection.

1. The government lacks money to support the nation's military forces. To save money, General Dustin Worm ordered that troops be placed in the homes of people living close to military bases. Former Governor Huntsman lives close to an army base, and two soldiers moved in to his home, even though he did not want them to be there.

2. Mr. Motta was arrested for shoplifting. He was caught stealing \$500.00 worth of candy. When he went to court he asked the judge to set the bail so that he could be free while awaiting trial (he would miss teaching too much). The judge agreed, he set bail at half a million dollars. Because Mr. Motta is a teacher, he could not afford that amount and remained in jail.

3. Mr. Motta received his trial. The jury found him innocent. The next day the prosecutor decides that the verdict was incorrect, and the prosecutor orders Mr. Motta to be arrested and tried for the crime again.

4. Calvin is accused of writing several bad checks. When he appears before the judge, Calvin asks for help preparing his defense because he is too poor to afford a lawyer. The judge tells Calvin that he is sorry that he is poor, but Calvin will just have to prepare his own case since he can't afford a lawyer.

5. Samantha's boss dislikes the ideas (beliefs) of the Church of Everyday Salvation. Samantha tells a coworker that she belongs to the church, and soon after, Samantha's boss fires her because she belongs to the church.

6. Mrs. Kimball writes a letter to the editor of the Salt Lake Times complaining about the way the government is treating convicts in federal prisons. Because of this letter, she is arrested and placed in jail.
